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

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What's In Your Backyard?

Glendale is fortunate in having a gorgeous variety of trees in our luxuriant canopy. It makes our community leafy, green, and desirable. Many are now mature trees from plantings when the community got started in the 1950s. That makes some of our trees around 70 years old. Our spruces and boulevard trees can easily hit 100, but depending on the species, 40 to 200 can be the life span. For those of you who have planted Limber pines (*Pinus flexilis*), they can live over a thousand years, bristlecone pines (*Pinus aristata*), even longer. Some very old trees are in nearby Edworthy Park. Visit a stand of Rocky Mountain Douglas Fir (*Pseudotsuga menziesii* var. *glauca*) along the Douglas Fir trail; some are at least 500 years old.

But we have trees that are aging out.

In our neighbourhood, we are facing a double whammy for our weeping birches. This is not a long-lived species to begin with, and some trees, like mine, are starting to age badly; they live about 40 to 50 years in Calgary. Secondly, they are also a water-loving tree.

The canopy on my tree is thinning out and branches have died and fallen off. If the top of the trees stops producing leaves and looks dead, it won't take long to die, progressing rapidly from top to bottom. I have had to make the difficult decision, in consultation with an arborist, to take it down. For decades, that tree has been a constant joy. A place for birds and squirrels to romp around in, and gorgeous golden fall colour. I will miss it.

One of my crabapples is having a tough time. Crabapples are thriftier than birches, but only live 40 to 60 years. Sadly, this tree with its pink spring beauty will also come down. A lot of birds will lose a place to roost, feed, and shelter. One badly sited tree, an apricot, is dying and an unknown fungus is slowly breaking it down, doing an important job of recycling.

I'm looking at shrubs to take their place. My delightful native pin cherry (*Prunus pensylvanica*) is now multi-stemmed and about three metres tall. Maybe another one? Native trees and shrubs can handle prairie dryness and clay soils plus foothills see-saw weather: chinooks, hail, cloudbursts, deep cold, wind gusts, no snow to snowmageddons, and heat.

Water restrictions are coming. The Bow Basin has twelve water shortage advisories as of December 2023. The City of Calgary's recommendation is to water most species to the roots one or two times a month during the growing season (April to September) and increase to once a week during hot weather. Use about 38 litres per inch of trunk diameter (at 54-inches above grade). The bigger the tree, the more water!

Keep an eye on your trees this summer, especially those older ones that just might be senescing. They'll need help this coming summer. Water well.

Keep them healthy so we can enjoy our canopy for years to come.

There are many huge weeping birches in Glendale. They are distinctive with their year-round white (and papery) bark and their graceful pendulous branches and gorgeous golden fall colour.

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
