
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North Central BRT (Centre Street MAX 301) improvements

We're making improvements to current transit service and amenities, while preparing for the future Green Line LRT.



Spring Cleaning Your Finances

Do you have a bunch of documents, statements, receipts, and more lying around? Well, April is the perfect time to sort this all out. April is often the time for spring cleaning. Although this mostly involves general cleaning of your house or donating items you no longer need. This time can also be used to 'spring clean' your finances.

Here are a few tips on how you can spring clean your finances this year:

1. Sort, Sort, and Sort Some More

Sort your financial documents into categories, this way it becomes easier to manage. Categories can include bank statements, bills relating to your home, receipts, contracts, and miscellaneous. Throw away (or shred which is a more secure option) that which is old and no longer relevant. This could be bank statements for an old credit/debit card, bills from a previous residence, or pay slips older than three months.

Create a filing system with labelled folders in a secure area of your house. Once this filing system is set up it becomes easy to file new documents and throw out old ones.

2. Consider Digital

Some documents are best to keep as hard copies such as rental agreements, mortgage statements, and work contracts. However, documents such as bank statements and receipts are available online these days which can be easily filed digitally either through Google Drive or directly on your computer.



3. See Where You Can Start Saving

Once everything is organized it becomes easier to see where your money goes every month. Consider creating an Excel sheet where you can clearly see where you spend your money. Here you can also create categories such as income, savings, bills, subscription fees, groceries, bank accounts, loans, and miscellaneous (spending on clothes, recreational activities, and luxury items).

Indicate in green the money that comes in your account monthly and indicate in red the money that comes out. You can create an easy equation after doing this to see how much money you have left every month.

When all this is done you could possibly see that you no longer use a certain subscription and could save money by unsubscribing, or you have a bank account you no longer use which you can close.

All of this may seem like a bit of a hassle, but once it is done you will not regret spring cleaning your finances. It will only make your life easier moving forward.

Built-in 1998, COU453 is one of the oldest playgrounds and one of two rated poor by the City of Calgary. It features a Little Tikes multi-play complex, a seesaw, a ride-on toy, swings and two benches. There is so much potential for this playground to become a welcoming, inclusive community space with updated features and play equipment.

We have more community connections to make in March and April. Look us up online and learn more about the Boosters!




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

The new City Nature YYC website will be online with information on the 2024 challenge (www.citynatureyyc. ca). The dates for the event are April 26 to 29. Follow @CityNatureYYC on Instagram. On May 6, local, national, and global results will be announced.

The Nose Hill checklist contains references to reptiles, fungi and lichen, amphibians, insects, shellfish, birds, and mammals. Sightings are in NW Calgary. This website features the chorus frog, the tiger salamander, the terrestrial garter snake, and more. There are 42 birds, among them hawks, blackbirds, sparrows, chickadees, starlings, wrens, geese, eagles, mallards, teals, kestrels, gulls, partridges, grebes, grouse, and vultures. Some other types are the northern flicker, downy woodpecker, and hairy woodpecker. The great horned, long-eared, and short-eared owls all appear in the list.

The May Plant Count is part of the annual May Species Count. The survey runs from May 25 to 31. The focus is on documenting the flowering status of native plant species across Alberta. This project promotes stewardship and appreciation of Alberta's natural areas. As a citizen scientist, you will collect data to be used for conservation. Here are the basics. Enter the location of your plant. Upload a photo. Enter the date of the observation. Add a report about the flowering stage. Choose the appropriate stage from those listed. There are many ID guides and checklists (in print or flipbooks online). Observations can be made manually on a data sheet and then submitted by email or snail mail. You would need to sign up for the mailing list and then receive data sheets and instructions (www.naturealberta.ca/-may-plant-count). are submitting observations online you will join the May Plant Count project for the flowering codes to be displayed in the iNaturalist phone app (www. inaturalist.ca/projects/alberta-may-plant-count).

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Ham and Pineapple Bake

Cheap and easy to prepare eggs are an inexpensive source of high-quality protein. Eating enough protein can help with weight loss, increase muscle mass, optimize bone health, and lower blood pressure.

A whole egg contains a tiny bit of every nutrient you need and there are many ways to prepare eggs but poaching or boiling them preserves most of their nutritional benefits.

Tasty and filling, eggs have been popular for thousands of years and in many cultures, eggs are a symbol of new life, fertility, and rebirth.

Eggs are a breakfast mainstay and frittatas, quiches, burritos, quesadillas, devilled, pickled, or creamed eggs are just some of the delicious ways to consume eggs.

This Ham and Pineapple Bake can be enjoyed any time of the day and pairs well with a side of fingerling potatoes and a tossed salad.

Prep Time: 20 minutes

Cook Time: 45 minutes

Servings: 4

Ingredients:

- 1 small loaf of French bread
- 4 tbsps butter
- ½ lb cooked ham cut into small pieces
- 1 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- 3/4 cup drained pineapple bits
- 4 eggs
- 2 1/4 cups milk
- 1 tsp ground mustard
- ½ tsp salt
- ½ tsp black pepper
- 1 tbsp chopped chives

Directions:

- 1. Butter a medium size glass baking dish. Slice the French bread and then spread butter on one side of each slice.
- 2. Next slice the bread into one-inch cubes and place in baking dish. Spread the ham cubes and pineapple bits on top of the bread and sprinkle with cheddar cheese.

- 3. In a mixing bowl, beat the eggs and then blend in the mustard, salt, pepper, milk, and chives. Pour the mixture evenly over the bread mixture. Cover tightly with saran wrap and refrigerate overnight.
- 4. The next day preheat oven to 350 degrees Fahrenheit.
- 5. Remove baking dish from refrigerator and place on middle rack of oven. Bake uncovered for 45 minutes or until puffed and golden in colour. A knife inserted in the centre should come out clean. Serve immediately.

Here are some major updates related to Ward 3, the City of Calgary, and Council decisions.

City-Wide Rezoning Proposal and Virtual Townhall

To address the on-going housing affordability crisis, cities across Canada are taking steps to make home building easier. The City of Calgary is proposing a city-wide rezoning, which will allow duplexes and rowhouses to be built in more places across the city. Postcards were mailed to affected residents and information sessions were held last month.

3-1-1 Introduces New Call Back Feature

Now when you call 3-1-1, you'll be notified of the approximate wait time, and have the option to choose to receive a callback if it is longer than one minute. This feature will be available 8:00 am to 4:30 pm, seven days a week, as these are the hours of highest demand.

The City of Calgary is the first 3-1-1 service in western Canada to offer this feature.

Last month the provincial budget for 2024 was released, and while the province boasted a modest surplus of just under half a billion dollars, we see many areas in desperate need of funding which they simply will not receive.

Calgary public schools are currently over 90% full on average across the city. Schools like Diefenbaker or SJAM right here in our own riding are full to the brim. This year we are welcoming 28,000 new students to the province and this budget only adds 35,000 new spaces over three years. So, we are only creating spaces at a third the necessary rate. This means we will see schools here in Calgary and across the province that are over capacity in the next three years.

Folks here in Calgary-Beddington deserve the best education for their kids and that means space to grow and teachers to learn from. We can do much better for our education system.

We also saw funding for healthcare kept well below the level needed to keep up with our booming population and know this can be a matter of great anxiety for folks who expect timely healthcare delivery when they need it.

To those of you that celebrate, I hope you all had a blessed Easter!

I am happy to announce that your government will be investing in a new K to 4 elementary school in the community of Evanston as per our 2024 budget. If passed, Budget 2024, which focuses strongly on education, would invest \$1.9 billion to support 98 school projects over the next three years. And an additional \$1.5 billion would be invested for educational learning supports for vulnerable students, children with specialized learning needs, and other students requiring additional supports.

Family doctors will soon be receiving additional payments to help manage an increasing number of patients. Alberta's government is pulling out all the stops to stabilize, strengthen, and improve Alberta's primary healthcare system. We are providing \$57 million over three years to provide family doctors and nurse practitioners with support to help manage costs related to their increasing number of patients.

Beginning March 1, childcare providers received about 80 percent of their monthly claim at the beginning of each month, in addition to the fees they collect from parents. This change to monthly claim advances will help achieve the government's commitment to introducing a new payment approach, ensuring childcare providers receive grant payments sooner. The claim advance will apply to childcare facilities, family day home agencies, preschools, and out-of-school care providers.
