Let's keep your neighbours and any visiting bears safe.



Data Privacy

from the Better Business Bureau

The possibility of a cyberattack by a foreign country has gone from being the stuff of science fiction to a common threat that is often reported in the news.

While it may seem like there is nothing an individual can do to stop a cyberattack, there are some best practices that consumers and businesses can do to help guard against losing important personal information to cyber thieves. When online, safeguard your information to help avoid scam fraud, and identity theft. Periodically, it is a good idea to review who has your information. The Better Business Bureau and the National Security Alliance offer the following tips to help secure the privacy of critical information.

- Share with care. Posts on social media last a long time. Consider who will see the post, how readers might perceive it, and what information it might reveal about the individual posting it.
- Manage privacy settings. Check the privacy and security settings on web services and apps and set them to your comfort level for information sharing. Each device, application, or browser used will have different features to limit how and with whom you share information.
- · Personal info is like money. Value it. Protect it. Personal information, such as purchase history, IP address, or location, has tremendous value to businesses - just like money. Make informed decisions about whether or not to share data with certain businesses by considering the amount of personal information they are asking for and weighing it against the benefits you may receive in return.
- Make your passwords long and strong. Use long passwords with a combination of upper- and lower-case letters, numbers, and symbols – eight characters for most accounts and twelve characters for email and financial accounts. Don't use the same password for multiple accounts, especially email and financial. Keep a paper list of your passwords in a safe place, not on or near your computer. Consider using a password vault application. See BBB's tips for creating a strong password.

DRCA Recreation Facility Update

Welcome to spring in Discovery Ridge! With a change in the seasons, we shift our focus from hockey and skating to tennis, pickleball, and other outdoor activities. A big thank-you once again to our fantastic ice rink volunteers who worked tirelessly this past winter to prepare and maintain our rinks. If you or your family enjoy the rinks, please consider volunteering to help as our rinks can only operate if we have enough community residents step up.

We would also like to ask all facility users to please be considerate when using the facilities and clean up after enjoying the amenities. We are entirely volunteer-based and unfortunately, a few volunteers are left to clean up garbage that is carelessly discarded around the rink and area.

We are pleased to advise that with use of casino funds we will be enhancing our tennis courts this year with the addition of state-of-the-art lighting. Work is expected to be completed later in the spring and will allow play to extend as weather permits into fall evenings. Lights will be on timers to ensure a reasonable cut-off time daily in consideration of adjacent residents.

Our two pickleball courts will be open for use on the hockey rink by the time you read; we encourage residents to try the fastest growing sport in North America!

The DRCA board continues to explore additional facility enhancements as funding becomes available.

Mural Proposed

A mural has been proposed for the side of the sea container Bottle Shack on Discovery Ridge Boulevard, across from Cornerstone Mall.

This sea container was installed in 2020 as a permanent secure location for receiving refundable bottles and cans, hence the name, Bottle Shack. The donations from the community produce a significant amount of revenue for the Discovery Ridge Community Association which helps support the recreational facilities and other community events which enhance Discovery Ridge as a desirable place to live.

The DRCA board decided last year that since the metal sea container Bottle Shack is a permanent feature in the community, the time had come to enhance it and make it a feature of our community space.



After reviewing several options, the above wildlife scene was selected as it is reflective of Discovery Ridge's unique position next to Griffith Woods. We will be supporting a local Alberta artist – Emily Beaudoin – who is hoping to start in mid-June as weather permits and the mural will be completed this summer.

The City of Calgary has partnered with the DRCA to work on improving wildlife and human cohabitation in Discovery Ridge, in particular with regard to waste and recycling services and strategies in our community.

Upcoming Initiatives:

- The City of Calgary Waste and Recycling outreach team will be conducting an educational door knocking campaign in Discovery Ridge. This is tentatively scheduled for early May.
- · Watch for the community information session hosted by AB Fish & Wildlife and City of Calgary Waste & Recycling at our Stampede Roundup.

Please secure your bins and do not place them out until the morning of pick up. This is a widely proven method to minimize negative wildlife/human issues. Let's work together to prevent any similar outcomes to last fall when bears had to be euthanized after becoming habituated to human garbage and compost.

Did You Know?

Drink cans (pop, beer, juice, etc.) are huge attractants for bears to blue bins. Please consider collecting these separately and dropping them off at the community Bottle Shack instead of putting them in blue bins. If you paid a deposit on the purchase of the item, then it is eligible for refund and these funds are necessary for our facility and event operations. Thank you!

Hello!

Have you been down to our courts for a game of tennis or pickleball this spring? Our recreation centre is a great site for many sports and activities such as tennis, pickleball, hockey, and soccer. It is also a gathering place for events such as Stampede Roundup and Music in the Park. Operating such top-notch facilities costs money, however, we are fortunate to be partnered with Alberta Gaming, Liquor & Cannabis (AGLC). Alberta has a unique charitable gaming model. It is the only province in Canada where charitable organizations are licensed to conduct and manage casino events.

Approximately every 18 months, the DRCA is assigned a casino to manage and shares pooled proceeds from these events with similar groups. This is the most lucrative fundraising effort we manage. The DRCA continues to explore enhancements to our facilities with the use of accumulated casino funds. Current projects include additional lighting for our tennis courts and the rink facility.

With this said, we have a casino fundraiser this month! It will run Sunday, May 21, and Monday, May 22, at Cowboys Casino. While I hope to have shifts filled by the time you are reading this note, we may still need volunteer support and would appreciate hearing from you. Window and Balcony Safety

from Alberta Health Services

With the return of warmer weather, Emergency Medical Services (EMS) would like to remind parents and caregivers of an often-overlooked hazard in the home – access to open windows. Every year, paramedics respond to emergencies where a child has fallen from an open window, often from the second floor. These can be avoided by following safety measures. Take the time to assess potential hazards in your home before a preventable fall occurs.

Windows and Screens

- Prevent access to windows by moving furniture such as cribs, beds, stools, and change tables out from under them.
- Keep drapery cords out of children's' reach. Wrap excess cord around cleats, or tie-downs to avoid a choking hazard.
- Remember, screens are not safety devices. They are designed to keep bugs out, not children in.

Balconies

- Do not underestimate a child's ability to climb. Furniture and other items stored on balconies and decks can be used to climb resulting in falls over the railing.
- Ensure that your balcony railings are not more than 10 cm (4 inch) apart. This will eliminate access between the vertical bars of a balcony, or deck.

Further Prevention Tips

- Toddlers and preschoolers are at highest risk of falling from a window, or balcony, but it may happen at any age.
- Direct supervision of children is the single most effective way to prevent falls from windows and balconies.
- Install safety devices which limit the distance in which a window be can open to a maximum of 10cm (4 inches).
- Ensure the safety device can be released quickly, so the window can be used for escape in case of emergency.
- Consider purchasing a portable air conditioner, which will enable windows to stay closed and secure.
- EMS is proud to be a member of the Partners Promoting Window and Balcony Safety. Take time to assess your home for window and balcony hazards and eliminate the risks before a preventable fall occurs.

Homeowners' Association (NDHA) News

Happy May, everyone! Spring is in the air, and you may have noticed an increased presence of our contractor (ULS) on site doing their spring cleanup. Work on our green spaces, parks, and medians will proceed as conditions permit and with hope, the foliage in the community has wintered well and will be in great shape for the growing season. The NDHA works hard to maintain greenspaces in the community, but it is a big area and sometimes we might miss a spot. Do let us know if you see something in need of attention. *Please note that the NDHA is not responsible for landscape maintenance in the new "The Pointe at Discovery Ridge" development.

NDHA Annual General Meeting 2023

The board of directors is finalizing arrangements to hold the in-person meeting the first week of June. NDHA members will be notified of the AGM details by email or post mail and will also see signage placed at the entrance to the community. In addition to the election of the new board of directors, updates on NDHA business and greenspace-related matters will be shared at the AGM, where we will also welcome your questions or concerns. We look forward to seeing you there! If you cannot attend the AGM, we ask that you send us your proxy vote so the required quorum is realized, and the meeting can occur.

Can You Step Up to Help?

The work of the NDHA is currently managed by seven (7) volunteers, all of whom are your neighbours. This keeps over \$100,000/year of your fee money in the community, instead of being paid to a professional management company. The cash saved has allowed us to fund the work to place unique landscaping in our medians, install dog waste bag dispensers, pay for graphic wraps to beautify our trash bins, install our annual holiday tree light display, and pay for the seasonal planter foliage displays by the roundabout. It also allows us to maintain and operate the waterfall and fund many other landscape projects, including all mulching and shrub replacements.

However, it's been the same people on the board for several years and we are long overdue for some new faces in the group. The NDHA is looking for both new board members and non-board member volunteers who can help with the workload. All skill sets welcome! We especially have a need for volunteers with any of the following: accounting expertise/experience to help our treasurer and bookkeeper, IT/web-based skills, someone who has an interest in writing our monthly news articles, and somebody with a passion for landscaping and plants. Please consider volunteering this year. Contact us anytime!

Thank you to the many community volunteers who have stepped up over the past 17 years as NDHA board members or committee helpers! Your time and effort have collectively saved the NDHA membership well over a million dollars. This allowed Discovery Ridge to incorporate and maintain some of the highest, and leading-edge, landscape standards in Calgary. The community would not look the way it does without the work you have contributed, and everyone appreciates what you have given the community over the years!

Drainage Swales

Spring rains are on their way! For owners with a concrete drainage swale in your yard, you are responsible for ensuring the swale is kept clear of debris. Rain and runoff must easily drain into the storm sewer system via the swale, so please have a look to ensure yours is clean and unobstructed. This is a City of Calgary bylaw. You do not want to be made responsible for flood damage caused by a backup on your property.



Street Sweeping

Discovery Ridge is scheduled for sweeping on Monday, May 8 (weather dependent). Please watch for signs that will be posted in the community to notify you in advance or visit the City of Calgary website for updates. Vehicles must be moved from the street during this operation, subject to fines or towing. Remove your

vehicle and trash bins so that the gravel and grime of winter can be swept away!

Trailers on Driveways

With yard projects and camping season upon us, please be reminded that parking a utility trailer or RV of any kind on or around your property is subject to City of Calgary Bylaws and Parking Authority rules. Detached trailers cannot be parked on City streets at any time. RVs and attached trailers can be parked on the street immediately adjacent to your home for maximum of 36 hours. It is illegal to park your RV distant from your home. RVs, boats, and trailers can be parked in a private front driveway for maximum 36 hours. Parked RVs, boats, and trailers cannot protrude over a sidewalk or roadway, obstruct access to a neighbour's driveway or garage, or block the view of intersections, crosswalks, playgrounds, or signs. Complaints for infractions on private property can be made to 311. Complaints for infractions on public property (on the street) can be made to the Calgary Parking Authority.

Programs and Services to Help You Quit Smoking

from Alberta Health Services

Every year, more than 4,000 Albertans die because of tobacco use, while tens of thousands more Albertans have serious tobacco-related illnesses that greatly affect their quality of life.

Commercial tobacco use (such as cigarettes, e-cigarettes, cigars, and chewing tobacco) is the leading preventable cause of disease, disability, and premature death in Alberta, and increases the risk of heart disease, lung cancer, oral cancers, chronic lung disease, diabetes, and other illnesses. Quitting tobacco is one of the best ways to improve health and well-being. It may take several attempts to quit, so it's important to not give up.

AHS has programs and services to help Albertans guit:

- The AlbertaQuits Helpline,1-866-710-QUIT (7848) provides one-to-one telephone counselling.
- Try a free text message service that gives tips and motivational messaging to help people quit. The text service includes support for quitting vaping and a live chat feature with quit counsellors. Enroll today by texting ABOUITS to 123456.
- The website albertaquits.ca provides information and tools for people preparing to quit.
- QuitCore is a group support program that provides people with strategies and skills they need to quit tobacco, while connecting them with others who are also trying to quit. This program is offered in person, as well as virtually through Zoom.

*Use of cessation medications increases your chances of success, and the cost of the medications may be covered. Check with your provider for coverage information.

Information and resources are available at health clinics, pharmacies, and dental offices in many communities and AHS locations, including cessation services created for patients who use tobacco or tobacco-like products.

Performance measure results in 2022 improved compared to 2021. Some highlights include:

- Responding to important social issues with the development of strategic teams and initiatives such as the Indigenous Relations Office and the Anti-Racism and Equity Programs, and sector-wide capacity building with the Mental Health and Addictions Strategy and the Community Safety Investment Framework.
- Advancement of affordable housing goals, including providing approximately \$11 million in Housing Incentive Program grants, leveraging \$55 million from the Rapid Housing Initiative, and selling nine surplus parcels through the Non-Market Land Sale.
- Improving public tree health with a robust tree inspection and pruning program, increasing resilience, and minimizing damage from severe weather events, pests, and diseases.
- Ongoing delivery of specialized transit to enhance mobility for Calgarians with disabilities throughout the pandemic despite significant changes in customer demand.
- Reliably delivering safe drinking water.
- Delivering waste, recycling, and disposal services while minimizing health and safety risks for our customers and employees.
- Distribution of \$179 million of prevention investments to 194 organizations to support and build capacity for community organizations. These investments included Family and Community Support Services, Crime Prevention Investment Plan, Community Safety Investment Framework, Emergency Resiliency Fund, Mental Health and Addictions, and the Capacity-Building and Emerging Issues Fund.
- Providing tax relief for Calgarians, including the Phased Tax Program, re-opening grants, hailstorm deferrals, hotel/motel deferrals, and the Property Tax Assistance Program. Indirect tax relief was also provided from the removal of Tax Instalment Payment Plan (TIPP) fees.
