LETTER FROM THE BOARD

Rink Volunteers Needed!

With winter quickly approaching we are looking for dedicated volunteers to join our rink crews. Do you or your family enjoy using our outdoor rinks? If so, please consider helping us make and maintain our ice.

Once the weather is consistently below freezing, we will start the initial rink flooding which is generally an allhands-on-deck approach taking a few weeks. Once the rinks are established, we then operate four separate rink crews, each working one week on and then three weeks off in rotation. The commitment varies but this schedule has worked well in past years.

But...it only works if we have enough people to operate the four crews. Each crew has a team lead that coordinates with that team and with other teams. We generally have an overall lead as well that coordinates as between the team leads. We typically have at least six volunteers per team, and more is always better.

With thanks to the many past volunteers who have worked many hours on the rinks, it is important to bring in fresh volunteers as others cycle out over time. This way we can have our experienced volunteers train up the new recruits and pass along years of ice-making knowledge.

This includes operating the equipment that the DRCA has purchased for rink maintenance.

The outdoor rinks in Discovery Ridge are amongst our best used and most appreciated amenities but only operate if we have enough volunteers. Please consider helping this year!

IMMEDIATE

0 m to 1.5 m

The Immediate Zone is a non-combustible area that starts at the house and extends to a 1.5 metre perimeter around the home and attached structures, including decks. Reduce the chance of wind-blown embers igniting your home by starting with these proactive steps:

- Choose non-combustible building materials when constructing or renovating your home.
- Clear vegetation and combustible material down to mineral soil and cover with non-combustible materials like gravel, brick, or concrete.

Elements in the Intermediate Zone are managed so they don't transmit fire to your home. Here are a few actions

Avoid planting woody shrubs or trees. If any are present, prune and maintain them regularly.

INTERMEDIATE

1.5m to 10m

you can take to reduce your home's vulnerability:

- Plant fire-resistant vegetation and select non-combustible landscaping materials.
- Avoid incorporating any woody debris, including mulch.
- Keep combustible items like firewood piles, construction materials, patio furniture, tools, and decorative pieces out of this zone.
- Move trailers, recreational vehicles, storage sheds, and other combustible structures into the Extended Zone. If that is not possible, store firewood inside your mitigated garage, shed, or other ember-resistant structures.
- Create a non-combustible ground cover, like a gravel pad, underneath and 1.5 metres around trailers,

EXTENDED

10m to 30m

The goal in the Extended Zone is not to eliminate fire, but to reduce its intensity. If your property extends into this zone, a few important steps you can take include:

- Selectively remove evergreen trees to create at least 3 metres of horizontal space between the single or grouped
- Remove all branches to a height of 2 metres from the ground.
- 🥚 Regularly clean up accumulations of fallen branches, dry grass, and needles to eliminate potential surface fuels.
- Continue to apply these principles if your property extends beyond 30m. Work with your neighbours in overlapping zones and seek guidance of a forest professional if affected by other conditions, like steep slopes.

Homeowners' Association (NDHA) News



Crisp mornings and early sunsets are sure signs that the snowy season is beginning in Calgary. We had a wonderful summer and fall season, which allowed our signature waterfall feature to run continuously (for the first time in several years!). Favourable summer weather also meant we saw the best from our curated landscape features, the features that make Discovery Ridge one of the most beautifully landscaped communities in our city. For the NDHA, the coming of winter means our focus turns to snow removal from pathways and our planning for the landscaping year ahead.

Fall Cleanup

ULS crews have been working to prepare our landscaped beds, medians, and turf areas for winter. The crews have tidied all median beds and linear parks by trimming back many perennials, weeding, litter cleanup, and sweeping gravel from pathways around playgrounds. ULS snow removal crews and equipment are in place and ready to go as soon as the snow flies.

Snow Clearing

When we do get snowfall this winter, you may notice the community pathways have been cleared while sidewalks next to main roadways remain snow covered for several more days. The NDHA shares responsibility for snow clearing in the community with the City of Calgary. The NDHA and City have different policies governing snow clearing:

- City policy is that sidewalks under its control will be cleared within 24 hours of the end of a snow event. If it is snowing anywhere in the City, the snow event is not considered "ended".
- The NDHA's policy is to have walkways and sidewalks under its control cleared within 24 hours of a snowfall in the community, and every 24 hours thereafter until the snow stops.

FAQ #22 on our website includes a map showing where the NDHA clears pathways. Note that unless adjacent to a private home or business, sidewalks on Discovery Ridge Boulevard, Discovery Ridge Lane, and Discovery Ridge Hill, in addition to several other small sections of sidewalk in our community, are the City's responsibility. Please call 3-1-1 if you have concerns about snow clearing in these areas.

If you have concerns with a NDHA-cleared pathway, please let us know. Early season snow often melts during the day and becomes ice in the evening. Please take care when enjoying our pathways this winter.

Holiday Lights and Decoration

Our holiday light displays at the entrance and near the leisure ice rink will be turned on in mid-November. We will also bring back the holiday foliage installed in the entrance planters for your enjoyment. The timing of this installation is weather dependent.

Progress on City Projects

You may have noticed that the City has taken action to rebuild the retaining wall behind Discovery Ridge Mount. The re-opening of the pathway beside this retaining wall is a real benefit for regular pathway users. While not part of NDHA's landscape area, there has also been significant work taking place in recent weeks to remove sediment from the Discovery Ridge Ponds in Griffith Woods. NDHA has heard that the City of Calgary will be hosting an information session about their plans for the Discovery Heights Pond and surrounding lands sometime this month. Hopefully this information

session will let us all know about what we can expect after the City lowered the level of the pond in spring 2024. It is good to see these projects move forward for the benefit of our community and all Calgarians.

Fees

The 2025 NDHA fee of \$325 was due on June 29. We would like to thank our members who have paid their fee on time, and ask that those who have not, please remit immediately. It is legally required. 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Yielding to Emergency Vehicles

For everyone's safety, it is important motorists understand how to correctly yield right-of-way to emergency vehicles when their lights and sirens are activated. You can help all first responders navigate roads quickly and safely by following these basic rules.

When an emergency vehicle approaches with lights and siren activated:

- If you're in the middle of an intersection when an emergency vehicle approaches with lights and siren activated, safely clear the intersection; be prepared to pull over.
- On a one- or two-lane road, motorists should move to the right side of the road, slow down, and then stop, remaining parallel with the road. Remember to signal.
- On one-way streets move to the nearest curb, either the right or left.
- On a road with three or more lanes, motorists should move to the nearest side of the road and stop. If driving in the centre lane, move to the right side of the road and stop. Remember to signal.
- Come to a complete stop and wait for the emergency vehicle to pass. Shoulder check for more emergency vehicles before re-entering traffic flow. Remember to signal.

• Emergency vehicles might use any available road space to maneuver. This could include shoulders or turning lanes, etc., in order to safely pass other traffic.

When operating a vehicle:

- Reduce speed to 60 km/h or the posted speed, whichever is lower, when passing any stopped roadside vehicle with flashing lights activated (emergency vehicles, tow trucks, maintenance trucks, etc.). This law applies to the lane immediately next to the stopped vehicles. If you're not in the lane next to the stopped vehicles, it is recommended to reduce speed and leave lots of space between yourself and emergency personnel.
- Do not break the rules of the road in order to give right of way to an emergency vehicle. This could include proceeding through a red light or making an illegal turn. Actions such as these jeopardize all motorists in the area.
- Drivers must place their full attention on the road and the safe operation of their vehicle at all times. The fine for distracted driving in Alberta is \$300 and three demerit points.
- Do not drive within 150 meters of an emergency vehicle with its siren and/or flashing lights on. For reference, 150 m is nearly 1.5 times the length of a football field.

Alberta Recovery Day, held in Calgary on September 21, 2025, was the kickoff for the inaugural Alberta Recovery Week. I joined the nearly 20,000 passionate individuals who came together to show their support for Alberta's recovery model, demonstrating the strength and resilience of our community. Events like these remind us that recovery is possible and that no one has to face their journey alone.

I want to thank everyone who participated, volunteered, and showed their support—it's your dedication that helps break down stigma and creates a more compassionate and understanding environment for all. Alberta Recovery Day is more than just a celebration; it's a powerful reminder of the importance of hope, connection, and community in the healing process.

A Local Historical Treasure

Signal Hill, a historically important, recognizable, cherished landmark located in the constituency of Calgary-West, began as part of Camp Sarcee during World War I while serving as a training ground for the Canadian Expeditionary Force. Soldiers created large geoglyphs on the hillside, made of over 16,000 stones, to spell out their battalion numbers (137, 113, 151, 51). These stones, preserved by many volunteers, continue to form a visible landmark today in Battalion Park.

The area was officially named Signal Hill in 1982. The geoglyphs have been restored and protected as a military memorial and heritage site.

On August 29, 1988, the 113th Battalion number at the site was designated a Provincial Historic Resource by Alberta.

The City of Calgary later designated the Battalion Numbers (including the 113th Battalion number) as a municipal historic reserve in 2015.

On November 11 we will remember thousands of brave soldiers who made the ultimate sacrifice in the cause of preserving our freedom. I encourage you to join fellow community residents at the Battalion Park Remembrance Day ceremony as this special day is commemorated.
